The Autumn Term

We were delighted to register more than 200 students into Year 12, including a significant number who had completed their GCSEs elsewhere. The new sixth form leadership team has worked incredibly hard to establish new working practices to ensure that students' time in school is well spent. The range of extra- and super-curricular activities continues to expand, enriching the sixth form provision. There have been a number of talks and lectures, and we have welcomed into school representatives from JP Morgan, Deloittes, Mazars and McLaren and also a consultant surgeon and practising dentist. We have continued to support students with their applications for Higher Education and degree apprenticeships (including offering practice interviews). There has also been a trip for Year 12 students to Merton College, Oxford. Careers advice for students in lower years was enhanced by the visit of the BBC Bitesize Careers Roadshow at the end of September.

We have held a number of parent information evenings in this first term, making clear our expectations and any changes to our provision. For the moment, parent-teacher consultation evenings are continuing online.

There have been two Charity Weeks so far this academic year. The Elgar and Moore event combined penalty shoot outs and a sponge the teacher event with the almost obligatory cake sale and tuck shop. A highlight of the Newton and Scott Charity Week was the talent show.

On the Friday before half-term we hosted a visit from the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby. The visit was arranged through Reverend Renate Tulloh who serves at the neighbouring St Francis of Assisi Church. The purpose of the archbishop's visit was to meet some young people from the local area to establish how the church may better meet their needs. We were joined by students and colleagues from Bournemouth School for Girls. The archbishop and his entourage greatly enjoyed their visit (including lunch!), commenting particularly



upon how well our students engaged with them. We were also pleased that Renate was able to join us for our annual Remembrance Service, which was exceptionally well observed by all members of our school community.

As is often the case as we draw towards the end of a term, we are bidding farewell to some colleagues who are leaving Bournemouth School. Mr Short, who joined the school as a teacher of Science in September 2021, and more recently has been a part of the sixth form leadership team, is leaving us to lecture at Brockenhurst College. Joining the school in 2019, Miss Clark has been an outstanding pastoral support assistant, both in terms of nurturing students, but also in cajoling them to meet university application deadlines. She is leaving us to join the staff at Dumpton School. After joining us in 2015 as a Science teacher, we were quick to recognise the experience of Mr McLennan, and subsequently he has been a Head of Year and the architect of our personal development curriculum. It is thanks to him that the School became involved in the "Distinguished Gentlemen's Ride" (hosting the end of the event) and men's health has attained a higher profile in the School. Mr McLennan has decided that it is now time for him to retire – but we hope to entice him back to Bournemouth School from time to time in the future. We thank all three colleagues for their contributions to the continued success of the School and wish them well for the future.

The autumn term always appears to be at least a week too long – perhaps due to the shortening of the daylight hours, colder weather and a proliferation of viruses resulting in lower rates of attendance of students and staff. I am immensely grateful to my colleagues in the senior team for their incredibly hard work and continued commitment to ensure that our students are served exceptionally well. As we approach the last week, we are looking forward to the senior prefect team selection process, our annual prize-giving evening, the Christmas concert and (most of all) our Christmas lunch. I am sure that when the end of term arrives, every member of our school community will be grateful for a well-deserved rest and the opportunity to spend more time enjoying the company of friends and family. We wish everyone a very happy Christmas and prosperous new year!

Review of the 2023-24 Academic Year

Introduction

When we returned from the summer holidays in September, we were encouraged by the results at GCSE, recognised that the proportion of A*/A grades at A level needed to improve, and were acutely aware of the likelihood of a long-awaited Ofsted inspection in the near future. We already had plans in place to improve the quality of teaching and learning across the school, with colleagues having undertaken a significant amount of preparatory work in the preceding term. As the academic year began, we were very pleased to have so many students wishing to join our Year 12; for the first time the total number of students on roll at Bournemouth School exceeded 1200!

As you can imagine, serving such a large number of students results in Bournemouth School being a very busy place. It is almost impossible to describe all that happens, and all of the opportunities that are offered to our students. This report aims to give just a flavour of life at the School over the 2023-24 academic year.

A new year, with new expectations

We held a number of parent information evenings in the first weeks of term to further explain the rationale for the well-publicised changes to our provision. We explained that the changes were being made to secure the highest levels of progress and outcomes for all students. The strategies that we adopted are based upon educational research and the best practice observed in our school and in other schools.

The main changes were:

- students would not talk in lessons other than at the direction of the teacher
- knowledge organisers would be introduced and will be the mainstay of students' homework
- the introduction of "Do Now" tasks and activities
- mobile devices ('phones and smart watches) would become prohibited items for Years 7-11

Very quickly, students and staff adapted to these new expectations. By the end of the first term, the school environment already seemed more orderly and purposeful. Senior staff responded to comments made by the School Council and adjusted the systems accordingly. Alongside improving students' behaviour, we were also keen to enhance the quality of classroom practice; staff training sessions, with an initial focus upon effective questioning, were well received.

Ofsted

Every year, the Spring term presents a number of challenges. As usual, the weather was rarely kind (preventing access to outdoor spaces at lunchtime), and the focus for students in Years 11 and 13 was on their forthcoming public examinations. In this academic year, the Spring term also heralded the much-anticipated Ofsted inspection.

The School had last been inspected by Ofsted in September 2011. Between May 2012 and November 2020, schools like ours that were judged to be outstanding in their overall effectiveness were exempt from routine inspections. Since November 2020, we had been awaiting a two-day inspection. At the end of February, the wait was finally over!

We hosted five inspectors on the first day and four on the second day of the inspection. "Deep dives" were undertaken in English, mathematics, science, religious studies, languages and product design. The inspectors also considered the overall quality of education, students' behaviour, attitudes and personal development, the sixth form provision, and how well the school was led and managed. They also considered how well we safeguard our students.

We were very grateful and touched by the support of parents during the inspection process; the messages of goodwill and the gifts of cakes and chocolates were very well received. Needless to say, our students rose to the occasion magnificently; they were a credit to themselves and their families. The inspectors were very impressed with how friendly and respectful they were, commenting upon the highly positive interactions between all members of the school community. Given the quality of our students, it came as little surprise that the School was found to be "Outstanding" in all aspects of its provision. Although pleased with the inspection outcomes, the school's leaders remained keen to continue our journey of improvement, and to ensure that we always offer the best possible provision for our students.

Much of the work of senior leaders in the summer term was then devoted to ensuring that the School was in a position to further improve. This included significantly restructuring the pastoral support teams, recruiting new and replacement staff, introducing a new student information management system and planning for capital projects to be undertaken over the summer holidays and beyond.

Highlights of the academic year

There were many highlights in the 2023-24 academic year. It was particularly pleasing to welcome an increasing number of former students into school to help better inform our current students about the career pathways and opportunities that are available to them. This theme was further enhanced by employer visits (such as JP Morgan, Jaguar Land Rover, Dyson, Lester Aldridge, Deloittes). These added to a diverse range of presentations and assemblies throughout the year. As ever, the Remembrance services on Friday 10 November were well observed. The main address was delivered by Mrs Ateaque and focussed upon the ultimate sacrifice of two former students in World War I. The participation of representatives from our cadet force was greatly valued, and the musical elements were performed faultlessly.

As ever, the charity weeks throughout the year were well-supported, with the cake sale, tuck shop and raffles particularly popular. The Newton and Turner charity week in the Spring term was particularly well-supported; the traditional activities were complemented by a number of other events including a sponsored swim of the distance equivalent to crossing the channel and a sponge the teacher event. Thanks to the efforts of the prefects, the highest amount in recent times was raised for Julia's House. As the term continued, the *"Safe Drive, Stay Alive"* presentation was given to students in Years 12 and 13, highlighting the importance of taking care when driving, and all students in Years 9 and 10 have completed a course on basic life support (delivered by a lecturer from Bournemouth University and intensive care nurses).

In the summer term, Geography fieldwork for Years 10 and 12 began. Students in Year 7-9 benefitted from a number of trips and visits during our Enrichment Week just before half term. The week included trips to Marwell Zoo, Monkey World, Thorpe Park and the Globe Theatre and also walking a section of the coastal path near Lulworth Cove (despite torrential rain on one of the days!). Organising the programme is a logistical challenge – and would be impossible without the dedication of a number of our support staff.

Our students' and staff's continued enthusiasm and support for the library resulted in the issuing of a staggering 16,659 books during the academic year. Students continue to demonstrate their zest for reading, entering the numerous House reading competitions with gusto. All Year 7 and 8 students took part in the Million Minutes Reading Challenge, logging an astounding total of 214,108 reading minutes during March. Year 9 students read 97 novels and 205 short stories as part of the Dystopian Literature house competition. The library continues to host a number of lunchtime and after school clubs for all year groups, including Warhammer, Dungeons & Dragons, a Year 7 and 8 lunchtime Book Club and a Carnegie Shadowing Group.

Thanks to the efforts of Mr Riddles and Mrs Barnard-Dyson, virtually all Year 12 and Year 10 students experienced a work placement for one or two weeks, respectively, during the term. This is an invaluable opportunity for our students to experience the world of work. Subsequently, we invited employers to a "Business Breakfast". The event proved successful, with a particular highlight being the student presentations, recounting and reflecting upon their experiences.

The focus of the second half of the summer term was upon ensuring that our Year 11 and 13 students were supported in sitting their GCSE and A level examinations, respectively. Mrs Knowles and her team of invigilators ensured the smooth running of the public examinations, which appears to be more complex year on year. Year 11 students celebrated the end of their examinations with a Prom held at the Vitality Stadium. We were pleased to be able to work with BSG and their PSA to ensure that the event was without incident and enjoyed by all.

Towards the end of the academic year, Year 8 students participated in team-building activities and a workshop on addressing sexual harassment. The team-building activities were organised and run by the senior cadets of the Combined Cadet Force, with the workshop delivered by a team from STARS (Sexual Trauma and Recovery Services) and the police.

Our Open Evening in July again proved popular with prospective Year 7 students and their parents. We welcomed over 470 families through our doors. As ever our students were excellent ambassadors, exemplifying all of the qualities that we hold dear, and, no doubt, securing a high number of applications for September 2025.

The Open Evening was followed by a very successful House Events and Sports Day, facilitated by the PE staff and the CCF, which was again held at the King's Park athletics' stadium. A number of longstanding records were broken. Scott House won Sports Day by half a point from Darwin House, and secured the overall House Championship for 2023-24. Throughout the academic year there were successes in football, rugby, and cricket as well as in cross-country, tennis, and track and field. The levels of participation in these extra-curricular activities is often staggering – a testament to the enthusiasm and dedication of our PE staff.

The final week of the academic year began with a celebration of the achievements of students in Years 7-10, combined with showcasing music, poetry, art and technology. We were delighted to welcome back to school Harry Beckett to present the prizes. Harry joined Bournemouth School in September 2016 from Brockenhurst Primary and was one of our highest achieving students at GCSE. By Year 12, he was appointed as a Deputy School Captain. Throughout his time with us, Harry dreamed of becoming a doctor. His journey was not without challenges, particularly in the sixth form, but his exceptional hard work secured him the A-level grades needed to study medicine at St Andrew's University last September. Harry's work ethic, resilience, and compassion for his fellow students always impressed us. He continues to serve as an excellent role model for our students, delivering an inspirational speech about the lessons learnt in the first year of university, and warmly congratulating each of the 100 or so prize-winners.

CCF and Scouts

A record 160 new recruits joined the CCF this year. Cadets from all three sections participated in an extensive training and activities programme in addition to the weekly parades, including a military skills camp, flying, fieldcraft exercises, adventurous training, a parachuting course, and RAF and army camps. The annual inspection in March was again passed with flying colours. The programme of events was the most ambitious yet, showcasing the breadth of activities in which our cadets are involved. The inspecting officer, Captain Lynn from the Royal Navy, was particularly impressed with the parade and the enthusiasm of all involved.

Bournemouth School's 35th Bournemouth Sea Scouts and Explorers also recruited well, with students offered a packed calendar of events. Highlights of the academic year included participating in the Bournemouth District Incident Hike (a friendly contest of land navigation, orienteering and problemsolving), providing a Guard of Honour for the attending dignitaries at the annual Bournemouth Remembrance Sunday Service, fundraising for Children in Need, visiting the Normandy landing beaches, participating in the camp at HMS Sultan in Gosport during May half term, and participating in the National Sea Scout Rowing and Kayaking Regatta weekend in London.

Collaborative working

We are continuing to work with local primary schools by offering to talk to parents of Year 5 students, providing Year 12 student volunteers to assist in developing their students' numeracy and literacy, and extending an "open door" policy to their staff and students. It was pleasing to host sports days for local schools, and to facilitate a "Science Experience Morning" for St Walburga's. We were also pleased to be able to again accommodate a BCP transition event at which primary school teachers and their secondary colleagues met to refine the transition process. Towards the end of the summer term, we also hosted a Science Teachers' Conference.

We are continuing to work with the other members of the South West Academic Trust, to determine how we can work together more effectively, especially on improving the access of disadvantaged children to a selective education and how we may respond to any new challenges that a new government may bring. We continue to work particularly closely with the other BCP selective schools and South Wilts Grammar School.

As part of our desire to become a more integrated part of the local educational provision, we joined a local School Improvement Network in September 2022. The network is operated by the Two Rivers Institute/Twynham Learning. Secondary partners include Twynham, The Grange, Poole High, Ferndown Upper, and Bourne Academy (all non-selective). There are a range of activities undertaken in partnership, all of which ensure that we are more outward looking and offer professional development opportunities for colleagues. We have found the programme of Peer Review Days to be of great benefit. On such days, 4-6 colleagues from partner schools visit us to evaluate the effectiveness of an aspect of school improvement (of our choosing). The team's findings help us determine the appropriate "next steps" on our improvement journey. Being a part of this network has been a positive experience for all colleagues involved, and has also resulted in forging constructive relationships between the partner schools. I am sure that we would not have received such a glowing Ofsted report had we not been a part of this network, and had not had the courage to adopt some of the successful practices that we had observed in our partner schools.

We are continuing to work with local teacher training providers in the hope that we may be able to secure the services of entrants to the profession more readily. From September 2024, the BPD SCITT at Twynham Learning will be partnering with Wessex Schools Training Partnership at Poole High School to form the 'Bournemouth Bay Teacher Training Partnership' with the 'Christchurch Hub' based at The Grange School and the 'Wessex Hub' based at Poole High School. The new partnership is committed to both excellence in ITT and to serving the needs of all schools in the locality, and ensure a strong talent pipeline of local teachers for local schools.

Examination outcomes

Whilst students enter the school with attainment levels above national averages, by the end of Year 11, the attainment **and progress** of all students is very high in comparison with national averages. GCSE outcomes are continuing to improve.

In 2024, there were 180 students (152 in 2024) at the end of key stage 4 with students being entered for 11 GCSEs on average which places them in the top 3% nationally. EBacc subjects form a strong academic foundation for the KS4 curriculum and the EBacc entry rate in 2024 was 83% (80% in 2023). The average attainment of students in their best 8 subjects was 73.3 (P8 0.71), with 74% of the cohort achieving a strong pass in the English Baccalaureate (65% in 2023) and 96% (94% in 2023) achieving a strong pass in both English and mathematics.

Our data shows that progress and attainment for SEN students are significantly above the national averages for non-SEN students. Disadvantaged students performed well at GCSE in 2019, but less well in 2022 and 2023. In 2024, there were 16 disadvantaged students – the P8 for disadvantaged students in 2024 was 0 (-0.32 in 2023) with an average EBacc points score 5.97.

Over the last five years the proportion gaining A* to B grades at A level has been well above the national average. Our students' outstanding achievements can be linked to the high quality of advice they are given about their sixth form options and the quality of the monitoring procedures that are in place to secure such excellent outcomes.

In 2024, almost 42% of all entries were graded A* or A (82% were graded A*-C), with the average point score per A level entry increasing to 39.6 (the equivalent of a B grade) from 36.8 last year. The proportion of the cohort attaining AAB or higher in two or more facilitating subjects also increased from 23% in 2023 to 35% this year.

Remarkably, in Further Mathematics, 61% of all entries were graded as A*/A, with more that 40% of entries in Biology, Chemistry, Economics, French, Mathematics, Physics, Religious Studies and Spanish also being awarded the highest grades. Compared to their GCSE outcomes, students made particularly good progress in English Literature, French, Further Mathematics, Physics and Spanish. Remarkably, seventeen students achieved at least 2A* and 1A grades.

On 5 December the DfE published the latest GCSE outcomes (see <u>https://www.compare-school-performance.service.gov.uk/</u>). A summary of the outcomes, ranked in order of GCSE progress, for all BCP secondary schools is shown in the table below.

Whilst our results are impressive on a P8 basis, it should also be noted that this has been achieved with a considerably higher than average number of GCSE entries than local schools, alongside a high EBACC entry which demonstrates the breadth of our curriculum. We believe that the 83% EBACC entry is within the top 5% nationally (the P8 is within the top 5% nationally, too).

Finances

The financial pressures, exacerbated by increased energy and staffing costs, have resulted in the School having to manage its finances very carefully. Unfortunately, despite the introduction of a national funding formula (NFF), the local authority still exerts a degree of influence over school funding. Last year, BCP applied to the DfE to top-slice local schools' budgets for 2024-25 by £1.3m in total, to mitigate an overspend of the high needs budget. Under the NFF, we should be receiving as a minimum £5,995 per pupil for 2024-25. As a result of BCP's "top slice" we will be funded at a rate of £5,968 per pupil. This means that we will be receiving around £25k less than we were expecting. I find it ironic that BCP is asking schools to do more for children with high needs whilst at the same time reducing our funding below this minimum level.

BCP have already applied to the DfE to transfer a higher percentage of funds from schools' budgets for 2025-26. Some at the authority believe that since we return a balanced budget each year and have a significant reserve, we can afford to subsidise BCP's high needs provision. There appears to be little realisation that as a single academy trust we are expected by the DfE to have a certain level of reserves, and that any additional monies are ear-marked for capital projects that cannot be financed in any other way.

Improvements

Despite a number of staffing issues, we forged ahead with a number of significant projects. Firstly, the heating project was completed on time and under budget in March, with final snagging completed over the Easter holidays. A number of cost savings were identified during the final months of the project's implementation, such as using a single water heater for adjoining rooms rather than separate units; this enabled further improvements to be made elsewhere, such as the replacement of a number of suspended ceilings and upgrades to classroom lighting, which in turn has led to lower running costs. We were also able to replace a significant number of classroom projectors.

During the past summer holiday, the main hall projectors were replaced with new ultra-short throw laser projectors which are far brighter, making presentations visible even in full daylight. Early in the academic year, we also replaced the fire alarm panel and improved fire coverage throughout the main building; as a result, every classroom, office and corridor now has a smoke detector. To improve security and safeguarding, the east and west entrance doors were fitted with electronic locks, reducing the burden on the site staff to unlock and lock the doors at appropriate times throughout the day as this is now fully automated. Staff have the ability to access the school through these doors using their ID cards.

A number of IT improvements have been made during this past year. Thirty-two additional computers were provided for the Sixth Form in the study centre, and these have been very well received and are used almost constantly throughout the day. At February half term we launched a new school website, which gives us more control and flexibility over the content we can provide, and has already streamlined a number of processes such as new student registration and staff recruitment and reduced our costs as this is now internally managed. During the Easter holidays, the computer suite in room 36 (effectively the basement) was relocated to the library block, where an air-conditioned classroom was refurbished with computer benches and additional power and network connectivity. Throughout the year, CCTV improvements have been made across the site, including to IT suites, corridors and external areas.

A major milestone was achieved after the May half term break with the successful move from SIMS to Arbor for our school information management system. This was a huge undertaking with an enormous amount of preparatory work to ensure not only that all the relevant information was migrated to the new system, but also to ensure that staff were sufficiently trained in the use of the new system by the start of its implementation.

An ambitious range of projects was planned for the summer holidays, including:

- preparatory work to completely refurbish the lecture theatre;
- modification of the serpentine walkway to the library block;
- renovating the former caretaker's house, so the building may be used for individual pupil mentoring, small groups, training sessions, counselling, interviews and examinations;
- servicing and repairing the external fire escapes at the rear of the main building and library block;
- completely refurbishing the toilets and washing facilities within the school's changing rooms at the Sir David English Sports Centre;
- replacing the computers in room 34 with brand new units.

Conclusion

In summary, the 2023-24 academic year saw the School being graded as "Outstanding" by Ofsted for all aspects of its provision, improved student outcomes at GCSE and A-level, significant improvements to the accommodation and infrastructure, and plans being put in place to secure our continued success.

The role of a headteacher is impossible without the support of governors, staff and parents. So many staff "went that extra mile" last year – especially during our Ofsted inspection. My senior leadership team colleagues and governors have again continued to work tirelessly to ensure that our provision for students is as effective as it can be. The breadth of activities and improvements described in this report, would simply not have been possible without the continued dedication and commitment of all our staff.

It continues to be a privilege to serve the Bournemouth School community and I believe that, with the Ofsted inspection behind us and despite continuing political uncertainties, we can all look to the future with optimism. We will never rest on our laurels, but always seek to continually improve.

Facílítíes update

The summer holidays saw an ambitious set of projects carried out successfully. Firstly, and possibly currently most visibly, the dilapidated canopy over the serpentine walkway to the library block was removed, and the walkway itself received new railings. The school's external fire escape staircases were cleaned and serviced, improving their condition where they had fallen into some disrepair and the tired and frankly unpleasant toilets in the Sir David English Sports Centre changing rooms were stripped out and completely replaced with modern, high-quality and easy-to-clean brand-new facilities.

Also, during the summer, to facilitate further improvements within the library block, we engaged contractors to carry out some demolition internally – the lecture theatre was returned to its original, as-built, state and capacity, and it was completely redecorated: more on this later. The lower ground floor was stripped of any remnants of asbestos and some plasterboard walls removed, in preparation for further renovations.

Despite all of the above going on, we also completely renovated the former caretaker's house internally, including the installation of a new heating system, new carpets throughout, a new kitchen and bathroom, and complete redecoration. This is now a secure, welcoming and useful venue for small meetings, one-to-one support sessions and individual examinations.

Since September, much of our attention has been focussed on further improving the facilities in the library block. Over October half term, the library itself received a new carpet, which not only made a huge visual improvement but has also given it a more comfortable, welcoming feel. The lecture theatre, which has been long overdue for some attention, is well on its way to becoming a desirable, fully-featured venue: three new projectors, a new sound system, upgraded lighting, new presentation furniture and state-of-the-art tiered seating with fold-out writing surfaces will give our students a stunning facility for larger group presentations, as well as a taste of the university-style education that many of them are preparing for. We have recently received confirmation that the new theatre-style seating will be delivered and installed at the end of January, so we hope that this entire facility will be ready for use after February half term.


Whilst works in the lecture theatre progress, yet more ambitious plans are unfolding in the rest of the lower floor of the library block. With the removal of two internal walls, the four smaller classrooms have become two large, light and airy spaces which will eventually host two brand new IT suites for our computer studies department, as well as an office and meeting space for the teaching staff. The toilets in this block are simultaneously being completely refurbished to the same high standards as those installed in the Sir David English Sports Centre. Additionally, another large room in this building, currently under used, will be refurbished to provide another IT suite housing around 50 new computers.

With some other cosmetic improvements to the entrance area, by around April time we envisage that the library block will once more be a key and vibrant part of the school – although of course the library itself has always been lively, engaging and well-used.



Before that, however, we expect to have completed a smaller-scale project on the upper terrace – albeit one with just as much impact: the provision of a canopy outside Le Bistro to provide students

with a sheltered outdoor space to spend their break and lunchtimes regardless of the typically unpredictable British weather! With our existing buildings sheltering the canopy on three sides, the more exposed end will be glazed to provide a degree of protection from prevailing winds. This exciting new addition will give us much more seating capacity during busy lunchtimes, just a step or two outside Le Bistro itself (the images to the right give some idea of the intended results).



Finally, we are currently in the process of submitting a bid to central government improvement funds for replacement of as many of our fire doors as possible. Many, if not most, of our existing doors are original to the building – making them around 90 years old at this point. Modern fire safety standards require doors to be able to withstand fire for at least 30 minutes to allow safe evacuation; having commissioned a survey of our doors, we have been advised that many of them would not achieve this requirement. The anticipated cost of replacing all the necessary doors is in the region of £500,000 – hence our CIF (Condition Improvement Fund) bid. If successful (and we are cautiously optimistic about this), then we are prepared to embark on a complete replacement project over the summer of 2025, to include classroom and corridor doors, complete with magnetic hold-open devices and fire alarm activated door release mechanisms. We will keep you updated with the progress of this ambitious project!

None of the above would have been possible without the incredible hard work and support of a number of key staff members – the premises and IT support teams in particular have worked tirelessly to ensure facilities are maintained throughout all the works going on around the school site, and to minimise the disruption to students' learning.

Emergency Planning

As you might expect, we have in place an emergency plan (also called a critical incident plan) to help us plan for and respond effectively to an emergency on site or during an educational visit. Needless to say, safeguarding and promoting the welfare of our pupils is paramount. The plan includes our initial response to an incident – depending on the circumstances, this might involve:

- Evacuation getting everyone out of the building safely
- Shelter (invacuation) getting everyone inside the building
- Lockdown getting everyone inside and locking them in to protect against potentially dangerous intruders

In the coming term, we will be sharing with students and parents the details of the plan, and how we intend to practise the procedures (in addition to the routine fire evacuation drills). The practising of these procedures will be undertaken in such a manner as to minimise disruption to learning and students' levels of anxiety; we believe that incidents requiring an emergency response remain very unlikely.

- Workflow Planner: Each student has been given a Workflow Planner to help manage their time and engage in proactive study. Departments have provided guidance on proactive activities, which can be found at the back of the planner.

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is everyone's responsibility.

On Tuesday 12th November, Dorset Police visited to speak to our Year 10 students as part of Operation Scepter, a national initiative to tackle knife crime. The presentation given by Firearms Officer Martin Garnish focused on preventative education around themes such as the consequences and dangers of carrying weapons; common misconceptions around knife crime; and locations of knife surrender bins in Dorset where knives could be deposited anonymously. Martin was clear to stress that Dorset is one of the safest places in the country to live, but the Police service remains proactive in preventing and detecting knife crime. He said that an important



part of their work, in addition to the enforcement work they do, is prevention. He said that young people carry a knife because they think it will make them safer, but carrying a knife can actually make them

more vulnerable. As you would expect, our students were superb and behaved impeccably. They asked very pertinent questions and engaged wholly with the visitor.

Product Design London Trip

On Thursday 7th November 14 Year 12 and 5 Year 13 students took part in a Design and Technology visit to the Design Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum.

The focus of the visit was to allow students to conduct first-hand research into Design History in preparation for upcoming projects and also to experience some of the temporary exhibits such as the Barbie Exhibition at the Design Museum!

Chris Jennings (Year 12 Product Design student) gave the following account of the day:

We left school at 6.45/7.00 on a coach for the 3-hour drive to London. Once there, we first entered the London Design Museum and had a walk through the Barbie exhibit, featuring the first Barbie Doll and the entire process by which the brand came into being. The exhibition focused on the cultural changes that have taken place since Barbie's launch and the way the brand has changed as a result. After this exhibit, we separated into smaller groups to independently walk around the museum to see all the different designers and their innovative works which made them famous. There was also a café there which had delightful pancakes with bacon and syrup!

We then walked to the Victoria and Albert Museum at around 1.00pm and had lunch. Following this, we explored the museums many sectors including Japanese, Roman and Architecture and Paintings. The Design section was the most useful though as we were able to gather primary resources of many seating designs for our next project.


Overall it was a great trip with Mr Davidson commenting:

Mrs Catford and Mr Davidson are very proud teachers. All of the boys in our Year 12 Product Design class have made a fantastic start to the year. We started with a 'design skills' project in September, based on isometric and perspective drawing, rendering and detailed annotation. As you can see from the images below, the students excelled and produced work to an incredibly high standard:



After the 'design skills', we have worked on our timber project – a beech chopping board. At first glance, this looks like a very simple project but it involved biscuit jointing, 2D Design work, engraving using the laser cutter, cutting with a jigsaw, routing, hand filing, sanding and oiling. If you have ever worked with beech, you will understand how hard it is and therefore difficult to shape and sand. Again, the quality of these projects has been extremely high, as seen in the pictures below:

The library is open throughout the day for use by classes and private study for sixth form students. This term Year 7 and 8 students were found reading or discussing in their mini book groups, working through different challenge genres, and Year 9 have ardently sold their must reads 'speed dating' style and created some outstanding blackout poetry.

Lunchtimes bring chess, board and card games; quiet reading and study, and the ever- popular Warhammer Club. Book Club meets every Tuesday, and are currently reading I Am Wolf by Alastair Chisholm, a bold and thought-provoking story set in a futuristic world where the ideas of identity, belonging and survival are challenged.

About the Lottery

The lottery is open to parents, carers, grandparents, staff and ex-pupils. Tickets are £1 each, paid by monthly standing order and a participant can hold up to 15 tickets. Each month's total income is split; 50% goes to the School Lottery Fund and the other 50% is split equally between 3 winning tickets, each drawn by a school pupil.

For example, if £600 of tickets are sold in a month, the School Lottery Fund will receive £300 and three ticket holders will get a cheque for £100 each. Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow ...

Closing a school of this size is never an easy or straightforward decision and given the difficulty we know this causes you, the parents, I thought you would welcome some background to the decision making process. The decision to close a school is taken by the Headteacher; following a risk assessment that is based on a number of factors. This decision has to be taken without knowing how the weather will progress during the day. Issues considered include site safety, the likely level of staffing, the availability of catering and also if bus services are running. Before any decision is taken, the Headteacher of Bournemouth School for Girls, Mr Sims, and I liaise and seek advice from senior colleagues, the site staff and the bus companies.

Although some staff, students and parents are able to move safely to and from school no matter how severe the conditions, we listen carefully to the police and the bus service providers. We do not wish to pressurise any student, parent or member of staff into making a journey that they believe to be unsafe. We also consider the level of adult supervision that is likely to be available at school. Should there be a predicted high level of staff absence, it would be very hard to guarantee a worthwhile day for those students who do manage to struggle in. If at all possible the school will remain open when there is snow. If there is a snowfall overnight we always endeavour to have made a decision by 7 am. If the weather deteriorates during the school day, we make the decision as soon as possible.

If it is necessary, in the interests of pupil welfare, to close a school because of extreme weather conditions, you would be notified as follows:

- an e-mail will be sent to those parents who have given us their e-mail address
- a message will be posted on the school's website www.bournemouth-school.org [Remember that you might need to refresh the page with the F5 key.]
- radio messages will be broadcast on Heart FM, Radio Solent, Fire FM and Wave 105 (the websites will also list the school as being closed);
- a message will be posted on the local authority's website www.bcpcouncil.gov.uk

Should we need to close the school during normal school hours, boys who already have parental permission to leave the school site in such circumstances will do so after having registered with their tutor. The remaining students will stay with their tutor until contact with home has been made, and appropriate arrangements for the student are in place.
